*Median household income, percent living in poverty, percent unemployment, percent of residents spending more than 30% of household income on house or rent*




Median household income, percent living in poverty, percent unemployment, percent of residents spending more than 30% of household income on house or rent




- Census tract 9.02 has the lowest median household income of \$29,652
- Census tract 3.01 has the highest median household income of \$88,250




- Census tract 9.02 has the highest percent of residents living in poverty at 35.50%
- Census tract 3.01 has the lowest percent of residents living in poverty at 2.10%



- Census tract 9.02 has the highest unemployment rate by 9.00%
- Census tract 3.01 has the lowest unemployment rate by 0.60%





*Percent of residents with access to broadband internet*









- Census tract 9.01 has the highest percent of residents receiving food stamps/SNAP at 26.70%
- Census tract 2 has the lowest percent of residents receiving food stamps/SNAP at 1.30%




# Overview









# Now What?

- Utilize the mobile health clinic
- Hire community health workers/navigators
- Create a program that supports unemployed and/or uninsured individuals
- Improve transportation access and awareness of current transportation resources
- Continue work with local food bank to target high need areas
- Work with physicians to give “food prescriptions”
- Continue work with local farmer’s markets to target high need areas and to accept SNAP/EBT
- Partner with local organizations and community members to set up and maintain community gardens
